The Ontario Police Video Training Alliance (OPVTA), in consultation with Animal Welfare Services (AWS), has developed an online course on the *Provincial Animal Welfare Services Act, 2019* (PAWS Act) for Ontario's police services. It was released to OPVTA's 77 member agencies as *OPVTA Vol. #186: Provincial Animal Welfare Service Act, 2019*. OPVTA members can access the course through the OPVTA Catalogue on the Canadian Police Knowledge Network and online at [OPVTA.com](https://www.opvta.com).

AWS is the primary body responsible for the enforcement of the PAWS Act and its regulations. As authorized under the PAWS Act, AWS works to ensure that standards of care are met and animals in distress are attended to.

Police officers and First Nations constables may observe violations of the standards of care under the PAWS Act when responding to calls for service. [Section 60 of the PAWS Act](#) authorizes police and First Nations constables to exercise certain powers of an animal welfare inspector, including the power to investigate PAWS Act offences and take possession of animals in distress.

This course takes approximately 35 minutes to complete and provides an overview of the PAWS Act, guidance on what to do when responding to calls involving animals and features a keynote interview with Chief Animal Welfare Inspector Paula Milne. The course covers topics such as:


- Ontario's animal welfare enforcement model;
- Key terms and provisions in the PAWS Act;

- Police and First Nations constable powers under the PAWS Act;
- Roles and responsibilities of the police as well as AWS and municipal animal control officers;
- Instances when the PAWS Act or the Criminal Code applies;
- The Violence Link;
- When police, AWS inspectors and municipal animal control officers may intersect and how they can work together; and
- Offences and penalties under the PAWS Act.

I trust this course will provide further understanding of Ontario's animal welfare system and clarity with respect to the role and responsibilities of police services when responding to calls concerning animals.



RE: **Interprovincial Record Exchange (IRE) System
Unavailable for Quebec**

The purpose of this memorandum is to advise the policing community that the Société de l'assurance automobile du Québec (SAAQ) is currently undergoing a digital shift with a goal of improving the experience of its customers, employees and partners. This large-scale project includes the launch of SAAQclik, a new online service platform that will be accessible 24/7.

In order to accommodate this transition, the Interprovincial Record Exchange (IRE) system for Quebec will be unavailable from January 30 to February 16, 2023. During this time, Quebec vehicle owners and drivers may be issued temporary paper drivers' licences, licence plates, or vehicle permits from Quebec (*see samples in Appendix 1*).

Quebec will be making static information available to a select group, such as Quebec police and CPIC. However, other jurisdictions will be required to contact the SAAQ directly in the event of specific situations.

Key Information:

Residents of a province may drive vehicles registered in their home jurisdiction on Ontario roads for a period of up to six months and use their valid driver's licence (including Temporary Paper Driver's Licence, Appendix 1), from another province, state or country for **60 days**. People who have moved to Ontario from another province have a period of **30 days** to register vehicles in Ontario.

During the transition period of January 30-February 16, 2023, Quebec will temporarily be issuing paper licence plates. Individuals may operate their vehicles with their valid Quebec driver's licence (including Temporary Paper Driver's Licence, Appendix 1), and Quebec vehicle owners may operate vehicles on Ontario's roads with temporary paper licence plates placed in the upper left of the rear window. These are issued to Quebec residents temporarily while metal licence plates are mailed.

We suggest that police services accept paper licence plates, when presented with a valid Quebec vehicle permit, as evidence of vehicle registration. Additionally, vehicle owners from Quebec may have vehicle permits printed on 8.5 x 11 paper. Sample documents are included in the appendix for reference.

For road-side suspensions and vehicle impoundments submitted during the outage period via the Suspension and Impoundment Management System (SIMS), information for individuals with a Quebec DL must be recorded manually.

Police services will be responsible for selecting an appropriate venue for exams to be written.



I am writing to advise that, beginning on **March 1, 2023**, the Centre of Forensic Sciences (CFS) is offering an expedited ballistic analysis service to all police agencies in Ontario.


The CFS employs the Integrated Ballistics Identification System (IBIS) to identify linkages between fired ammunition, seized firearms and shooting incidents. These linkages can provide critical information to police investigations into gun crimes. Timely evidence submissions and quick dissemination of linkage information are critical in maximizing the benefits of this intelligence.

In 2022, the CFS successfully piloted the “Rapid IBIS” service with three police agencies, in which preliminary linkages in gun crimes were identified an average of seven days following item submission.

To utilize this “Rapid IBIS” service, case acceptance guidelines, including timely submission and streamlined item packaging, must be met. For more information, please see attached Rapid IBIS Case Acceptance Guidelines document.

Rapid Integrated Ballistics Identification System (IBIS)

Case Acceptance Guidelines

The Rapid IBIS service is an initiative implemented by the Centre of Forensic Sciences (CFS) for the purpose of expediting the notification of preliminary firearm case linkages developed through the Canadian Integrated Ballistics Identification Network (CIBIN) database search.

Cases submitted with the following criteria will be prioritized under this Rapid IBIS service:

- i) Submission is received at the CFS within ten days of the occurrence.
- ii) Items are submitted using the CFS streamlined packaging guidelines. Packaging information can be found on the [Submission Packaging Guidelines for SFI and RAISE Cases](#).
- iii) Submission consists exclusively of agency-generated test fires submitted under the Suspicious Firearms Index (SFI) stream or exclusively of cartridge cases from a shooting incident submitted under the Rapid Assessment for IBIS Selection Examination (RAISE) stream.
- iv) The only request is to determine whether the submitted items are linked to another shooting occurrence/recovered firearm previously uploaded on the CIBIN database (i.e., IBIS only).
- v) Items do not require examination by another CFS section.
- vi) Fingerprinting and DNA swabbing, if applicable, has been completed.

The Firearms Unit will issue a reporting product within 15 days of submission to CFS.

Note: Depending on operational capacity, additional case types may be examined and reported on as outlined in the “Examination” and “Reporting” sections below. For these cases, the reporting product may exceed 15 days as the criteria specified above has not been met.

Examination

Cases are examined as outlined in the SFI and RAISE streams. Information on the examination processes for these streams can be found on the [CFS website](#).

Based on the examination, where applicable, select items are acquired onto IBIS and a general search is conducted against previously uploaded cases within the CIBIN database. If a possible hit develops, the Rapid IBIS streamlined process would involve an on-screen review of the cases using the MatchPoint system. Three outcomes are possible:

- A preliminary linkage is developed
- A preliminary linkage is not developed
- Further comparison is required using the physical items and a comparison microscope
 - In this scenario, the comparison is diverted from the Rapid IBIS stream to the regular process stream

Reporting

IBIS Notification Letter – a letter notifying the client that items have been uploaded to the CIBIN database is issued. Details such as calibre, type or number of firearms that discharged the fired ammunition components are not provided.

Firearms Investigative Aid Notification Letter – a letter notifying the client that a preliminary linkage has been developed between two or more cases is issued. The linkage will be reviewed by a Firearms Scientist but will not be subject to verification by a second Firearms Scientist. If the submitter requires confirmation of a preliminary linkage, a request for a confirmation of the preliminary results must be submitted to the Firearms Unit.

Limitations

In some instances, a case may require additional work that cannot be completed within the turnaround timeframe of the Rapid IBIS stream. Examples of such instances include;

- Possible linkages to a case(s) that cannot be completed on-screen and requires a microscopic comparison
- Cases where the submitted items require examination by another section
- Request to search against the United States ballistics database, known as the National Integrated Ballistics Information Network
- Cases where a specific cross-reference was requested
- Cases where additional items or a change in the examination process is required (e.g., request for additional test fires/submission of the firearm)

Note: Cases that do not meet the Rapid IBIS case acceptance criteria and require microscopic comparisons can result in longer reporting times.

I am writing to request an All Chiefs' Memo be disseminated to Ontario Chiefs of Police in relation to the federal *Regulations Amending Certain Regulations Made Under the Firearms Act* SOR/2022-91, which were registered on October 21, 2022, and took effect on that date.

The national freeze on handguns was introduced via amendments to the *Conditions of Transferring Firearms and Other Weapons Regulations*, SOR/98-202. The *Regulations* allow specific exempted individuals to import or receive domestically transferred handguns.

Under the amendments, a CFO will only be able to authorize the transfer of a handgun to an individual who:

- a. Holds an Authorization to Carry (ATC) issued under Section 20 of the *Firearms Act* and needs the handgun:
 - o To protect the life of that individual or of other individuals.
 - o For use in connection with his or her lawful profession or occupation (armed security, trappers, wilderness occupations such as bear baiter, bush pilot); or
- b. Has provided the CFO with a letter from a provincial or national sport shooting government body indicating the individual trains, competes or coaches in a handgun shooting discipline that is on the programme of the International Olympic Committee or the International Paralympic Committee.

To assist law enforcement in understanding and navigating these regulatory changes with respect to firearms, the Chief Firearms Office has prepared a list of questions and answers, as well as a quick reference tool, which are included with this request for distribution.

Coming into force of regulatory changes affecting handgun transfers

This information is intended for law enforcement members for use in investigations, property vault management of firearms / handguns, and etc.

Background

In accordance with the regulatory amendments governing the authorization by Chief Firearms Officers (CFOs) of transfers of and authorizations to transport handguns, a CFO may authorize the transfer of a handgun to an individual only if they need the handgun:

Exempted Group:

1. to protect the life of an individual or other individuals pursuant to an Authorization to Carry (ATC) issued by a CFO under section 20(a) of the *Firearms Act*;
2. for use in connection with their lawful profession or occupation pursuant to an ATC issued by a CFO under section 20(b) of the *Firearms Act (FA)*; or
3. to train, compete or coach in a handgun shooting discipline that is on the programme of the International Olympic Committee or the International Paralympic Committee, and the individual provides a letter to a chief firearms officer from a provincial or national sport shooting governing body indicating:
 - a. that the individual trains, competes or coaches in such a discipline;
 - b. the specific discipline in which the individual trains, competes or coaches; and
 - c. that the handgun that the individual seeks to acquire is necessary for training, competing or coaching in that specific discipline.

Note: This regulatory provision does not apply in respect of any application for the transfer of a handgun that was submitted before this regulatory amendment came into effect at 00h01 on October 21, 2022.

Questions and Answers

Q1. What do these changes mean for firearm owners?

A1. As of October 21, 2022, individuals and businesses will no longer be able to transfer the ownership of a restricted or prohibited handgun to a buyer who is an individual, unless the buyer belongs to one of the identified exempt groups.

Q2. Can individuals transfer a handgun to someone else?

A2. A CFO may authorize the transfer of a handgun to an individual only if the transferee (individual buying the handgun) belongs to one of the identified exempt groups and needs the handgun:

1. to protect the life of an individual or other individuals pursuant to an ATC issued by the CFO (Ss. 20(a) *FA*);
2. for use in connection with his or her lawful profession or occupation pursuant to an ATC issued by a CFO (Ss. 20(b) *FA*); or
3. to train, compete or coach in a handgun shooting discipline that is on the programme of the International Olympic Committee or the International Paralympic Committee.

Q3. Are current competition shooters who have registered handguns in their possession exempted from the new regulations?

A3. An individual can continue to use their registered handguns for competition shooting and target practice. An individual can only acquire a new handgun if the individual belongs to one of the identified exempt groups and needs the handgun:

1. to protect the life of an individual or other (Ss. 20(a) *FA*);
2. for use in connection with his or her lawful profession or occupation (Ss. 20(b) *FA*); or
3. to train, compete or coach in a handgun shooting discipline that is on the programme of the International Olympic Committee or the International Paralympic Committee.

Q4. Are individuals with registered handguns allowed to use them?

A4. Yes, individuals can continue to use their handguns for purposes such as target practice.

Q5. Will the CFO issue ATTs to move handguns?

A5. Yes, the CFO will continue to issue ATTs for handguns.

Q6. Are individuals who own registered restricted firearms that are not handguns allowed to transfer these firearms?

A6. Yes, a licensed individual, with the appropriate licence privileges, may continue to acquire a restricted firearm that is not a handgun for the purpose of forming part of a gun collection, for target practice or target shooting competitions, or for a lawful profession or occupation.

Q7. Are individuals who own registered grandfathered prohibited firearms that are not handguns allowed to transfer these firearms?

A7. Yes, a licensed individual, with the appropriate licence privileges, may continue to acquire a registered grandfathered prohibited firearm that is not a handgun.

Q8. Can a business sell or transfer handguns to individuals?

A8. A business can transfer / sell a handgun to an eligible individual who belongs to one of the exempt group and needs a handgun:

1. to protect the life of an individual or other individuals pursuant to an Authorization to Carry (ATC) issued by a CFO (Ss. 20(a) FA);
2. for use in connection with his or her lawful profession or occupation pursuant to an ATC issued by a CFO (Ss. 20(b) FA); or

3. to train, compete or coach in a handgun shooting discipline that is on the programme of the International Olympic Committee or the International Paralympic Committee.

Q9. Can a business transfer a handgun to another business?

A9. A business can transfer / sell a handgun to another firearms business if the business has the privileges on their firearms licence to acquire handguns (Restricted and/or Prohibited).

Q10. Is a licensed firearm business allowed to acquire handguns?

A10. Yes, a business will continue to be allowed to acquire handguns from a business or an individual and register the handguns provided that they have the appropriate privileges on their firearms licence to acquire handguns (Restricted and/or Prohibited).

Q11. Is a business allowed to import handguns?

A11. Yes, a business will continue to be allowed to import and register newly imported handguns provided that they have the appropriate privileges on their firearms licence to acquire handguns (Restricted and/or Prohibited). A business will require an Import Permit, issued by Global Affairs Canada, to import a handgun.

Q.12. What happens to an individual who has a firearm prohibition order with conditions allowing the transfer of their restricted firearms and handguns / prohibited firearms and handguns to a suitable licensee?

A12. A non-handgun prohibited firearm can be transferred to a suitably licensed individual.

A non-handgun restricted firearm can be transferred to a suitably licensed individual for the purpose of forming part of a gun collection, for target practice or target shooting competitions, or for lawful employment or occupation.

An individual can transfer a restricted or prohibited handgun to an individual if they belong to one of the identified exempt groups.

An individual can transfer a restricted or prohibited handgun to a business if the business has the appropriate licence and privileges.

An individual can transfer a restricted or prohibited firearm to a business if the business has the appropriate licence and privileges.

Q13. If an individual, who has a firearm prohibition order with conditions allowing the transfer of their restricted or prohibited handguns, cannot find a suitably licensed individual who belongs to one of the identified exempt groups, what happens to their firearms that are in police custody?

A13. The options available to the prohibited individual in this instance are as follow:

1. Disposal by way of destruction;
2. Exportation of the restricted / prohibited handgun as per lawful federal and international authorities (contact the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF) for the exportation of firearms to the United States; contact Global Affairs to import firearms to countries other than to the United States);
3. Deactivation of the handgun by a gunsmith approved by the Chief Firearms Office for the activity of deactivation; or
4. Selling the handgun to a business that has been issued a firearms licence to acquire restricted / prohibited handguns by the Chief Firearms Office.

Q14. Can public agents acquire handguns?

A14. Public agents continue to be allowed to acquire handguns via transfer from a licensed business or by import if an import permit has been issued by GAC.

Note: federal, provincial, and municipal government departments and Agent Crown Corporations are not bound by the *Export and Import Permits Act* when executing their core organizational mandate and can import and export firearms without obtaining a permit from GAC. Examples, include DND, RCMP, OPP, CBSA, MNRF, etc.

Q15. What is the difference between the prohibited firearms and handguns that were prescribed under Orders in Council in 1978, 1992, 1996 and 1998 and those that are prescribed as prohibited under Order in Council, May 2020?

A15. The answer is multi-faceted.

There are some prohibited firearms that certain individuals can be in possession and acquire because the firearm(s) and the individual are grandfathered as the individual held a valid registration certificate on the date the affected firearm became prohibited.

Those individuals have continuously maintained a valid firearms licence and a valid registration certificate for any of the following sub-class of prohibited firearm (formerly known as restricted weapons):

- A fully automatic firearm (Ss. 12(2) *FA*);
- A converted automatic firearm (Ss. 12(3) *FA*);
- a firearm listed in Order No.12 (SOR/92-471);
- a firearm listed in Order No. 13 (SOR/94-741), or
- a .32 or .25 calibre handgun or a handgun with a barrel equal to or less than 105mm (Ss. 12(6.1) *FA*).

The full list of prohibited firearms, some of which individuals cannot lawfully possess, can be found in the *Regulations Prescribing Certain Firearms and Other Weapons, Components and Parts of Weapons, Accessories, Cartridge Magazines, Ammunition and Projectile as Prohibited or Restricted* (commonly referred to as the Classification Regulations). Refer to Part III Firearms and Other Weapons, section 84 of the *Criminal Code*.

Further to the above, on May 1, 2020, the Federal Government amended *Regulations Prescribing Certain Firearms and Other Weapons, Components and Parts of Weapons, Accessories, Cartridge Magazines, Ammunition and Projectile as Prohibited or Restricted*. These amendments resulted in the reclassification of over 1,500 types of firearms as prohibited firearms and devices.

Currently the Order protects owners from criminal liability for unlawful possession of these prohibited firearms if those individuals were previously in lawful possession of one or more of the newly prohibited firearms or prohibited devices on the day of the amendments to the Classification Regulations came into force. The Federal Government will be introducing a buy-back program for firearms affected by the OIC of May 1, 2020.

There are exemptions for Indigenous People and sustenance hunters under the Amnesty Order that allow for the continued use of the newly prohibited firearms (if previously non-restricted) by individuals who hunt or trap to sustain themselves or their families, and by Indigenous person exercising Aboriginal or treaty rights to hunt.

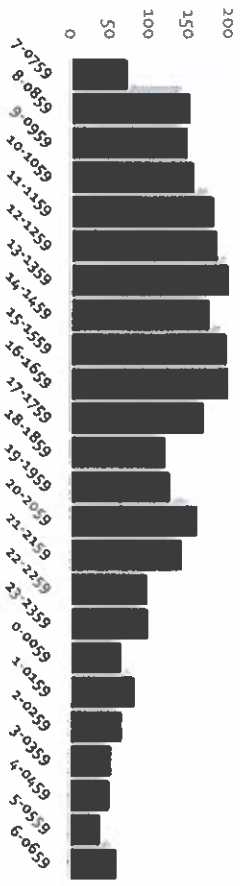
Number of Calls Generated by Day of Week



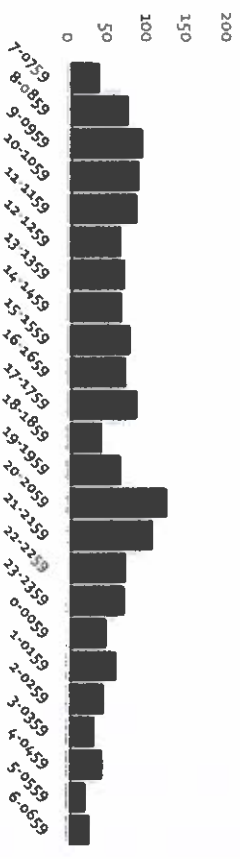
Number of Calls Patrol Dispatched by Day of Week



Number of Calls Generated by Hour of Day



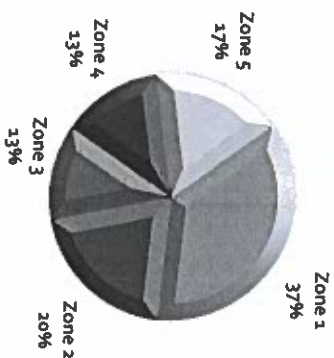
Number of Calls Patrol Dispatched by Hour of Day

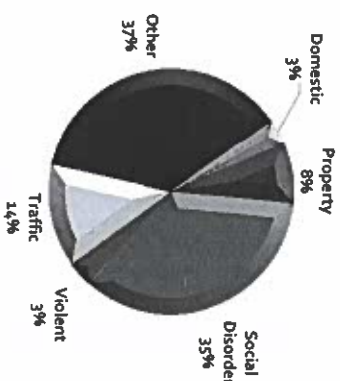
Percent of Calls Patrol Dispatched by Area

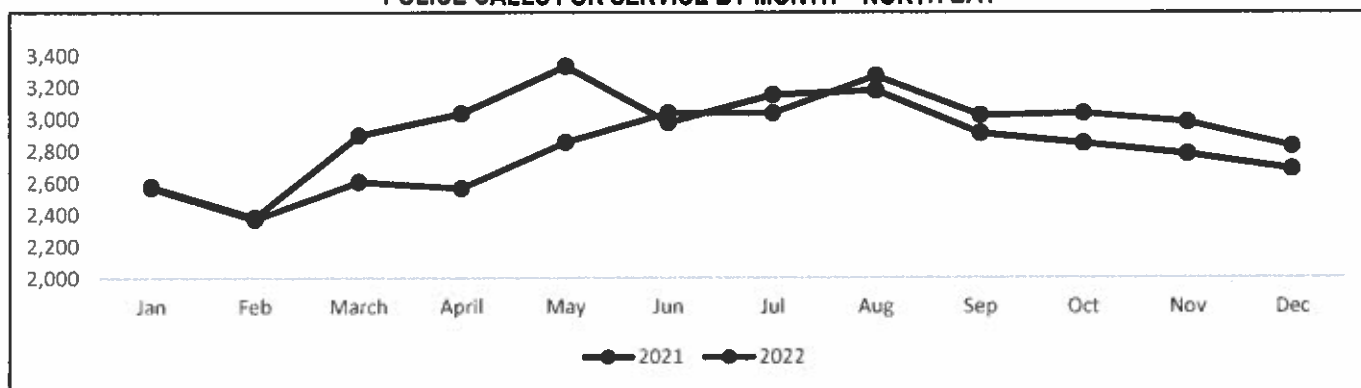
