Statistical Reports

Deputy Chief Tod presented the Condensed Monthly Statistical Report and the Revised Condensed Monthly Statistical Report for the months of April and May. There was a slight drop in the number of criminal activities reported with an overall decrease of 10% reported. North Bay and Area Needle Exchange Services

An information item, the Chief informed the Board of the implications of the Nipissing Detoxification and Substance Abuse Programs which will cease to operate its round the clock drop off needle exchange program at the end of July. This closure could result in an unsafe situation for the general public and our front -line workers. Although primarily a health issue, the ramifications will reverberate and filters its way through to law enforcement. Discussions are still underway with respect to how this void will be filled.

2017 Data Analysis - Mobile Crisis Team

As of the end of May 2017 the Mobile Crisis Team had direct involvement with 114 individuals in our community. At the same time, the North Bay Police Services received 1073 mental health related calls, an average of 7 calls per day. In a community collaborative partnership between the North Bay Regional Health Centre and the Police Services both agencies provide trained personnel who respond to individuals or families experiencing a behavioural and/or mental health crisis. The Mobile Crisis Team connects patients to needed services before situations escalate.

2017 Gateway Hub Healthy Communities Fund Proposal \$30,000.00 The Chief shared the parameters for the \$30,000.00 funding that has been provided through the District of Nipissing Healthy Communities Fund. Funds were approved to cover the costs associated with continued operation of the Gateway Hub with respect to support for clients who are vulnerable/high risk due to a variety of factors on a one-time emergency cost which is not currently covered by any other agency or funding source; funds to support the continued coordination of the Situation Table twice weekly meetings to ensure clients are connected to ongoing programs and services; and specific costs associated with implementation of preventative community programs to address risk factors.

2016 Data Analysis Final Report - The Gateway HUB

Twelve community agencies brought referrals to HUB in 2016. Of the 163 people who directly benefitted from the 106 HUB interventions, 127 were individuals with 24 involved families. The majority of referrals were from the North Bay Police while the Nipissing parry Sound Catholic School Board introduced the second largest proportion followed by the Near North District School Board. Leading the way in treating the cases was the Community Counselling Centre of Nipissing at 18.8% followed by the Canadian Mental Health Association at 18.8% and the North Bay Police Services serving only 3.3% of the situations in 2016.

Quarterly 2017 Budget Report -- Second Quarter

The status report on the 2017 Budget was presented by the Chief. A concern with Sworn and Civilian overtime was discussed. This report will be forwarded to the City for inclusion in their regular Council meeting Agenda...

Near North Crime Stoppers - 2017 Jail-a-thon

The Chief relayed to the Board that nearly \$20,000.00 was raised during this annual one-day event.



Since 2009 we have received between \$15,000.00 and \$16,000.00 annually from the Ministry to operate our RIDE Programs. This year the Ministry is allocating \$15,653.00 to the North Bay Police Services Board for the 2017-2018 fiscal year.

Please find attached a copy of a letter from Ms. Yoko Iwasaki of the Program Development Section of the Ministry and the Contractual Agreement associated to our Service's acquisition of these funds. The Board will note in her letter Ms. Iwasaki has requested that we do not make any public announcements regarding our allocation of these funds, as they may be making a formal announcement at a later date.

I require the above noted resolution authorizing the Board Chair to enter into this Agreement with the Ministry.

Please Find attached a report prepared by Inspector Jerome in relation to the 2016 Crime Severity Index (CSI) Report. In his report, Inspector Jerome provides an explanation of the CSI and a brief analysis specific to North Bay and how we compare with other communities.

The Board will note from his report that our Overall CSI value was 66.13. This represents a 7.4% increase in crime from our ranking in 2015.

Our value for Violent Crime was 81.53 which represents a 2.7% increase in violent crime when compared to 2015. Our Violent Crime value is also 28% higher than the provincial average and 8% higher than the national average.

Finally our Non-violent Crime was listed at 60.39. This represents a 9.8% increase from 2015.

On page 6 of this report Inspector Jerome has included a chart providing our CSI history in North Bay from 2012 to 2016.

On page 7, he has included a chart comparing our CSI statistics to the other 4 large northern Ontario communities.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Crime Severity Index (CSI or the "Index") is a measure of police-reported crime that reflects the relative seriousness of individual offences and tracks changes in crime severity. It was first introduced in 2009 and was developed at the request of the policing community to address limitations to the traditional Crime Rate and therefore provides a clearer picture of trends in crime.¹

For police jurisdictions, the CSI is particularly useful in determining if police-reported crime has become more or less serious over time, or if police-reported crime in one jurisdiction is more or less serious than crime reported in other areas of the country.

The CSI complements two other measures of crime:

- 1. Police-Reported Crime Rate (CR);
 - measures the volume of crime
 - not a measure of all crime
 - adds to our understanding of police workload
- 2. Victimization Survey Data;
 - measure Canadians' experiences of crime
 - · may or may not be reported to the police
 - assists police in determining level of assistance to victims

Police-reported crime statistics in Canada, 2016: highlights

Police-reported crime in Canada, as measured by both the crime rate and the CSI increased for the second year in a row in 2016. The CSI measures the volume and severity of police-reported crime in Canada, and has a base index value of 100 for 2006. The CSI increased 1% from 70.11 in 2015 to 71.0 in 2016 but remained 29% lower than a decade earlier in 2006.

At 5,224 incidents per 100,000 population, the police reported crime rate, which measures the volume of police reported crime, was virtually unchanged in 2016. This rate was 28% lower than a decade earlier in 2006.

There were almost 1.9 million police-reported *Criminal Code* incidents (excluding traffic) reported by police in 2016, approximately 27,700 more incidents than in 2015.

Although the rate of police-reported violent crime declined overall, violent violations which experienced an increase rate were: sexual violations against children (+30%), violations causing death other than homicide (+14%), offences related to the commodification of sexual activity (+11%), aggravated sexual assault (+6%), forcible confinement or kidnapping (+4%), threatening or harassing phone calls (+3%), the use of, discharge, and pointing of firearms (+3%), assault with weapon or causing bodily harm (+1%), and aggravated assault (+1%).

In 2016 police reported 611 homicides, 2 more than the previous year. Due to the growth in Canada's population, the homicide rate decreased 1% from 1.70 homicides per 100,000 population in 2015 to 1.68 homicides per 100,000 population in 2016. The rate of attempted murder also decreased by 1% between 2015 and 2016.

In 2016, the overall volume and severity of violent crime, as measured by the violent CSI, was 75.3 and virtually unchanged from the previous year. In contrast, the police-reported violent crime rate, which measures the volume of violent police-reported crime, declined 1% to 1,052 per 100,000 population. That year, rates for half the violent violations decreased, with the largest decrease reported for criminal harassment (-7%).

After notable increases in property offences in 2015, police-reported crime rates for all types of property crimes decreased or remained the same in 2016, with the exception of theft of 5,000 or under and total fraud. The rate of total fraud, which includes general fraud (+14%), identity fraud (+16%), and identity theft (+21%), was 14% higher than in 2015.

The overall volume and severity of non-violent crime, as measured by the non-violent CSI rose to 69.3 in 2016, marking a 2% increase from the previous year. The increase was largely driven by increases in police-reported incidents of fraud.

Police-reported rates of cannabis-related drug offences declined for the fifth consecutive year in 2016. The rate of possession of cannabis declined 12% from 2015.

The rate of impaired driving decreased by 3% in 2016 to 194 impaired driving incidents per 100,000 population, representing the fifth consecutive decline. The overall rate for drug-impaired driving increased by 11% with rates in Ontario increasing by 38%. The rate of drug impaired driving (8.5 per 100,000 population) remained low compared with the rate of alcohol impaired driving (186 per 100,000 population).

In 2016, the Youth Crime severity Index (youth CSI) which measures both the volume and severity of crimes involving youth accused (both charged and not charged) declined 2%. The youth non-violent CSI also declined 8%. The rate of youth accused of drug crimes (-14%), mischief (-13%), motor vehicle theft (-13%), breaking and entering (-11%), and theft of \$5,000 or under (-8%) were all lower in 2016.

In 2016, the violent youth CSI increased 5% due to higher rates of police-reported youth accused of attempted murder (+115%), sexual violations against children(+38%) and robbery (+6%).

INTRODUCTION

<u>Overall</u>

The Crime Severity Index is a measure of police-reported crime that reflects the relative seriousness of individual offences and tracks changes in crime severity. It

was first introduced in 2009 and was developed at the request of the policing community to address limitations to the traditional Crime Rate.

The CSI complements two other measures of crime: the police-reported Crime Rate, which measures the volume of crime, and victimization survey data, which measure Canadians' experiences of crime.

The CSI data allows for three separate reports on crime: one on overall crime, one on violent crime and one on non-violent crime. Other measures available include indexes for police-reported youth accused of crime, and weighted clearance rates.

Benefits

The problem of crime in Canada can be viewed through multiple lenses. There is no one measure that can adequately summarize all of the information desired on the extent and characteristics of crime. Different approaches serve different purposes, yet together, they provide a more comprehensive picture of crime than any one approach alone.

The police-reported Crime Rate tells us about the volume of crime coming to the attention of the justice system. It is not a measure of all crime occurring in Canada. However, it adds to our understanding of police workload and demands on the justice system.

The victimization data, for the offence types included, tell us about Canadians' experiences of crime, whether or not they are reported to the police.

The CSI provides a different way of looking at crime in Canada. It adds to our understanding of crime because it takes into account the relative seriousness of individual offences.

The CSI was introduced to address many of the limitations associated with the traditional police-reported Crime Rate so it provides a clearer picture of trends in crime.

For example, the offences making up the majority of the traditional police-reported Crime Rate are high-volume, less serious offences, such as mischief, minor thefts and disturbing the peace.

Due to their high volume, trends in these less-serious offences actually drive the trend in the overall police-reported Crime Rate, whereas trends in more serious crimes have less impact on the rate simply because they are less numerous. For example, one incident of homicide is equal to one incident of mischief in terms of the impact on the overall Crime Rate.

For the CSI, each crime is assigned a weight depending on its seriousness and as such, serious crimes have more impact on fluctuations in the Index. For instance, weights used in the CSI range from under 6 for gaming and betting to over 7,500 for murder.

Victimization surveys have shown us that less serious crimes are less likely to come to the attention of police. Variation in reporting for less serious crimes impacts the

comparability of police-reported statistics for jurisdictions. Because less serious crimes have less impact on the CSI, its trends are more comparable.

With the CSI, we see that serious offences have more impact than they did with the traditional Crime Rate.

For example, for the overall CSI, break-ins account for about one-quarter (24%) of the Index, compared with about 9% in the Crime Rate. On the other hand, mischief accounts for about 5% of the Index, instead of 15% in the rate.

In terms of the Violent CSI, robberies account for about 29%, rather than just 6% in the Violent Crime Rate. However, common assault accounts for only 9%, instead of 41% in the violent crime rate. Homicide, a very serious and relatively low-volume offence, accounts for 9% of the Violent CSI as opposed to 0.1% of the Violent Crime Rate.

Calculations

The seriousness of each offence is determined by using objective sentencing data from the nation's courts. Each individual offence is "weighted" according to the severity of the sentences handed down by judges. Sentencing data come from Statistics Canada's Adult and Youth Courts Surveys. Weights for the Index are based on the average of five years of courts sentencing data and they are updated every five years, using the most recent data available from the courts. It should be noted that outliers (atypically very long and unique sentences for a given offence) are not included in the average.

Weights are updated to reflect recent sentencing practices and to account for any new *Criminal Code* offences. To calculate the actual weight for an offence, the incarceration rate for that offence – that is, the percentage of all convictions receiving a jail sentence – is multiplied by the average length of the prison sentence in days.

Incarceration rates and average prison sentences are calculated at the national level using five years of courts data.

USING THE DATA

The Index gives us a different view of crime and allows us to answer questions that were not easily answerable previously, such as: Is police-reported crime in Canada more serious than it was last year? Is police-reported crime in my jurisdiction more or less serious than in another jurisdiction? Has police-reported crime become more serious over time?

The CSI tells us if police-reported crime was relatively more or less serious than in previous years. For ease of interpretation, the Index is converted to 100 for the base year, which is 2006.

For jurisdictions, the CSI is particularly useful in determining if police-reported crime has become more or less serious over time, or if police reported crime is more or less serious in one area than another.

The overall CSI for the North Bay Police Service's jurisdictions (which includes the Municipality of Callander) in 2016 was 66.13. This represents a 7.41% increase in crime from our ranking in 2015.

The violent CSI in 2016 was 81.53 and represents a 2.72% increase in violent crime over 2015.

The non-violent CSI in 2016 was 60.39 representing a 9.86% increase from 2015.

Due to the relatively small sample size of violent crime, a relatively small increase in the number of serious violent crimes occurring during the calendar year can result in a substantial impact to the related CSI.

The police-reported CSI, which measures both the volume and seriousness of crime in Canada, has a base index value of 100 for 2006. Canada's CSI in 2016 was slightly higher than in the previous year, increasing 1% from 70.10 in 2015 to 70.96 in 2016, marking a second annual increase. Since 1998, Canada's CSI has steadily declined, with the exception of a 5% increase reported in 2015 and a 3% increase reported in 2003. The 2016 CSI is 29% lower than a decade previously.

The overall volume and severity of violent crime, as measured by the national violent CSI, increased 0.27% between 2015 and 2016 to 75.25. Since 2012 the violent CSI for North Bay has increased by 24%. The 2016 measure of violent crime is 2.7% higher in North Bay than it was in 2015.

Non-Violent Crime has increased nationally by 1.5% from 2015 but has increased in North Bay by 9.8% during the same period.

When compared to other northern municipalities, North Bay's overall CSI experience places it second lowest in severity measure within the above-mentioned Northern Ontario municipalities, third when considering the violent CSI and second lowest once again when assessing the non-violent CSI.

The chart and three graphs that follow further illustrate the CSI comparators for Canada, Ontario and North Bay.

On August 22nd, 2016, *Maclean's Magazine* published a series of articles on crime in Canada, based on their analysis of Statistics Canada's <u>2015 Crime Severity Index</u>. In their graphic for sexual assault, North Bay was rated as "the 5th most likely city for a person to be sexually assaulted in." In 2015, North Bay had a CSI sexual assault measure of 106.8, which is significantly above the national average of 59.6.

In 2016, North Bay saw a 20% decrease in the total number of sexual assault incidents (65 in 2015 to 52 in 2016) that were reported to police. With respect to level 1 sexual assaults the CSI rate dropped from 108.46 to 84.75. The 2016 provincial CSI rate for level 1 sexual assaults is 52.11 and 56.56 nationally. More notable however is that the total number of sexual violations against children rose from 10 to 24 (+140%).

Between 2015 and 2016, the rate across Canada of police-reported sexual violations against children increased 30% from 15 to 19 incidents per 100,000 population. Since 2010, when full data for these offences became available, the rate of sexual violations against children has increased 76% due to a general upward trend. However, 2016 accounts for the largest reported increase.

CONCLUSION






