





I am sure I am missing other achievements of the CORE unit, but these ones come to mind quickly.


We continue to work on the Downtown Cameras and will be bringing a report to Council this summer after one last consultation with interested parties.



#### **Executive Summary**

The auditors were tasked to inventory all liquor exhibits seized under the *Liquor Licence Act* and other statutory authorities as well as review the processes in place for dealing with such exhibits. This was done pursuant to the Standard Operating Procedures on the Collection, Preservation and Control of Evidence and Property (LE-020).

As part of this audit, the team has conducted an inventory of all liquor in our possession to ensure that they are subject of an entry on OPTIC RMS.

#### Introduction

The procedures for processing liquor exhibits are outlined in SOP LE-020. The SOP has been reviewed to ensure accuracy. Changes, if required, will be submitted to the Chief of Police by the Quality Assurance Officer.

The findings and recommendations contained in the following pages are intended to assist the Service in developing an efficient system that clearly meets the needs of the organization, without impacting in a significant manner on the resources available.

On June 27, 2013 the audit was conducted on the inventory in the RMS Niche system. A total of thirty (30) occurrences with a varying amount of exhibits were in the Service's inventory. Exhibits from eleven (11) occurrences were identified as completed. A request for authority to dispose of these exhibits has been be submitted, granted and the disposals have been completed.

#### **Audit Objective**

To determine if all liquor exhibits were properly documented and accounted for, in compliance with the *Police Services Act* and Service Procedures.

#### **Audit Scope**

The purpose of this is to inventory all exhibits under the *Liquor Licence Act* or other legislative Authority and review the procedures surrounding those seizures.

#### <u>Methodology</u>

The audit was conducted by first obtaining OPTIC/RMS entries for all liquor exhibits on the computer system and comparing them to the items that had been secured in the Exhibits Section for evidence purposes.

#### **Audit Findings and Recommendations**

#### Finding:

Twenty six (26) items cited on RMS Niche as liquor were located in the Exhibit section, three (3) were located in the Forensic Identification Section and one (1) had been signed out for court. There was no difficulty locating these items and segregating those items that were no longer required for retention purposes from those that still were required for evidentiary purposes.

#### **Recommendation:**

1. There are no recommendations at this time.

#### Conclusion

No inconsistencies were identified. The procedures in place at this time appear to be meeting our needs and meet the requirements of the *Police Services Act*

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#### Resolution 2013-01

Title: E-Bikes

#### Preamble:

On October 3, 2006, the Province of Ontario began a pilot project to evaluate the use of power-assisted bicycles (also known as electric bikes or e-bikes) on roads and highways where conventional bicycles were allowed. The pilot was open to all Ontarians 16 years-of-age and older and ran for three years. During the pilot, electric bicycles were treated as bicycles and had to follow the same rules of the road as set out in the Highway Traffic Act that applied to cyclists, with two exceptions:

- · Operators had to be 16 years of age or older, and
- All operators had to wear an approved bicycle helmet at all times.

In 2009, the government proceeded with legislative amendments to Bill 126, (the *Safer Road Act*) to entrench the pilot project's operating requirements in law.

The provincial legislative establishment of E-bikes as a bicycle conflicts with the federal legislative definition of a motor vehicle and electric bike's natural position in the Power Two Wheel (PTW) motor vehicle class with other two-wheeled conveyances. The conflict arises as a result of other two-wheeled conveyances, such as motorcycles, limited speed motorcycles and mopeds all fall under licensing, permit and insurance regulations.

WHEREAS there is a lack of regulatory continuity for Power Two Wheelers relating to E-Bikes, and

WHEREAS the current state of government regulations surrounding PTWs as they relate to E-Bikes is inconsistent, incongruent and inequitable, and

WHEREAS the Province of Ontario has a multi-tiered licence and permit requirements for PTWs, and

WHEREAS there is a need for harmonization of approach for PTWs by bringing E-Bikes under regulatory control and consistent treatment and comprehension by all road users of where E-Bikes fit into the regulatory spectrum by legislators, law enforcement and the public at large.

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police calls on the Government of Ontario to define E-Bikes a motor vehicle under the *Highway Traffic Act* and require a permit and insurance, and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police calls on the Government of Ontario to provide a lower tier of licencing requirement (similar to M1 written test requirements or the boating on-line test), which would establish a baseline of rudimentary knowledge for PTW operation. This would establish a permit requirement for a nominal or rebate-able fee and require minimal insurance coverage, and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police calls on the Government of Ontario to consolidate the E-Bike and Moped definitions and performance/restrictions under existing Motor-Assisted Bicycle (Moped) regulatory standards and require (after an education and grace period) that operators and owners of E-Bikes comply with licencing and permit regulations for Mopeds, (this would allow E-Bikes to travel up to 50 km/h – the same as Mopeds)

#### Resolution 2013-02

**Title: Commercial Motor Vehicle Speed Regulations** 

#### Preamble:

Current legislation does not address the speed of commercial motor vehicles (CMV's) on roadways other than 400 series highways where the speed limiter legislation is applied. The majority of our provincial highways have a posted speed limit of 80 km/hr; therefore, the CMV speed limiter of 105 km/hr still allows CMV's to travel up to 25 km/hr over the posted speed limit. The concept of treating CMVs different from passenger vehicles is not new. Already, separations exist in the *Highway Traffic Act* with regards to brakes, tires and other mechanical components.

WHEREAS a driver of a passenger vehicle is treated the same as a driver of a fully loaded dump truck with regards to section 128 of the *Highway Traffic Act* (HTA), where the owner of the CMV is treated more severely than the driver. When a driver of a CMV receives a speeding charge of 15 km/hr over the posted speed limit, there are no demerit points to the driver while the owner receives two CVOR points, and

WHEREAS available data obtained from the Ministry of Transportation (MTO) in relation to CVOR registered vehicles charged under section 128 HTA shows that in 2010 there were 8,200 charges issued and in 2009 there were 8,600 charges issued, and

WHEREAS data indicates that in 2005 there were 398 reportable collisions involving CVOR vehicles, 316 in 2006 and in 2007, there were 441 reported. Where the collision involved a fatality, in 98 percent of the cases the deceased was an occupant in the passenger vehicle, and

WHEREAS roadways, considered rural roads, with a posted speed limit of 60km/hr or more accounted for 78 percent of all fatal collisions involving heavy trucks. 49.5 percent of all personal injury collisions involved the same classes of vehicles. One way traffic roadways accounted for only 1.4 percent of fatal collisions and 3.4 percent of personal injury collisions where heavy trucks were involved, and

WHEREAS there is considerable difference in stopping distances between a passenger vehicle versus a 4-axle commercial vehicle; dump truck. It is estimated that the CMV takes approximately twice as long to stop as the passenger vehicle when traveling at the same speed:

- 60 km/hr the passenger vehicle stops in 30 metres while the dump truck stops in 58 metres
- When the speed was increased to 80 km/hr, the distance also increased for the passenger vehicle to 48 metres and for the truck, 95 metres
- At 100 km/hr the passenger vehicle manages to stop in 70 metres however, the truck required 140 metres to stop.

WHEREAS public safety is paramount, thus slower speeds for commercial vehicles would decrease the severity of collisions thus reducing the potential for serious injury or death.

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police calls on the Government of Ontario to change to the *Highway Traffic Act* as it relates to speed of commercial motor vehicles 9CMV) on the roads and sets out definitions with respect to vehicle types and suggests that these vehicles that fall within licence classes A, B, C, D be treated differently than those of other licence classes, and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police calls on the Government of Ontario to specify that a commercial vehicle with a registered gross weight or actual weight in excess of 11,000 kgs or that is towing a vehicle where the combined weight of the towed vehicles exceeds 4600 kgs or by means of a bus with a designated seating capacity of greater than 24 passengers all fall within this criteria, and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police calls on the Government of Ontario to communicate potential changes to the public based on public/highway safety, positive environmental and health care impacts (societal costs), and industry cost savings.

Title: Ontario Tri-Service Public Safety Communications Interoperability

#### Preamble:

This resolution calls for the Public Safety Communications Interoperability to be named as a priority for Province of Ontario and Tri-Service Chiefs Associations.

WHEREAS the Ontario Association of Fire Chiefs the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police, and Ontario Association of Paramedic Chiefs have passed or are in the process of passing a resolution similar to this, and

**WHEREAS** the safety, security and prosperity of Ontarians including firefighters, police officers, paramedics, and other emergency service providers depends upon effective communications between public safety agencies, and

WHEREAS a coordinated provincial partnership amongst all levels of government should be based on all five lanes of the Canadian Communications Interoperability Continuum (governance, standard operating procedures, technology, training and exercises, and usage), and

WHEREAS international studies and Canadian public safety responder experience show that the lack of adequate public safety communications interoperability negatively impacts emergency response and increases the associated casualties, severity of injuries, number of lives lost, and economic impact of emergency incidents, and

WHEREAS the Canadian Association of Fire Chiefs, the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police, and the Paramedic Chiefs of Canada joined in issuing a joint resolution in 2008 on the issue of public safety communications interoperability calling upon the Government of Canada to take action to improve public safety communications interoperability, and

WHEREAS this joint Tri-Service resolution led to the creation of the Communications Interoperability Strategy for Canada, signed in Toronto in January 2011 by the Government of Canada and all Provinces & Territories and supported by the National Tri-Service Chiefs Associations, and

WHEREAS the Canadian Association of Fire Chiefs, the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police, and the Paramedic Chiefs of Canada have consolidated efforts to improve communications interoperability by creating the Canadian Interoperability Technology Interest Group (CITIG) as a Federally Incorporated Not-for-Profit Corporation supporting over 100,000 public safety personnel as the "One Vision — One Voice" of public safety agencies, and

WHEREAS numerous reports, studies and both National and regional workshops held in Ontario over the past five years have recommended that the Government of Ontario provide Provincial vision, leadership and funding to improve public safety communications interoperability, and

WHEREAS the Ontario Association of Fire Chiefs, the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police, and the Ontario Association of Paramedic Chiefs created the Ontario Tri-Service Interoperability Committee in 2010 as a joint interoperability committee that is committed to cooperatively

addressing the challenge of public safety communications interoperability in accordance with the Canadian Communications Interoperability Continuum, and

**WHEREAS** the Government of Ontario launched the Province of Ontario Interoperability Task Group (POINT) in 2010.

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police calls on the Government of Ontario to recognize the Ontario Tri-Service Interoperability Committee as our lead group to support and improve public safety communications interoperability in Ontario.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police calls on the Government of Ontario to designate the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services as the lead agency, in partnership with the Ontario Tri-Service Interoperability Committee and other key stakeholders in developing and supporting a whole of government Ontario Public Safety Communications Interoperability Strategy.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police calls on the Government of Ontario to commit financial, policy, and other human resources within the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services and in partnership with the Ontario Tri-Service Interoperability Committee to provide the vision and leadership required to achieve communications interoperability amongst public safety agencies across Ontario.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police calls on the Ministry of Health to conduct an immediate review of its policy prohibiting member services of the Ontario Association of Paramedic Chiefs from communicating via their current and future communications systems with local public safety emergency responders with a view to ensuring that all responders can communicate "as required and as authorized."

Title: Provincial Victim Assistance Ontario (VAO) Modernization Proposal

WHEREAS the Province of Ontario has undertaken a project to revamp victim services including an amalgamation of the existing VCAR's, Supportlink and VQRP programs into one, and

WHEREAS the driver behind this change is to provide effective, high quality support to victims of crime through a restructuring process that would occur within the confines of the existing provincial VCAR's, Supportlink and VQRP funding allotment, and

WHEREAS the November 2012 release of the proposed VAO program was met with a great deal of concern from those who currently delivered the services, resulting in a level of concern and feedback which caused an interim cessation of the program by the Ministry of the Attorney General to allow for further consultation, and:

WHEREAS upon completion of the Ministry consultation process, a final report was prepared that did not reference victims of tragic circumstances or police based victim service unit funding, which need to be addressed to ensure a fair and equitable program is developed.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police calls on the Government of Ontario to recognize victims of tragic circumstances and include them in any future proposal dealing with victims' assistance.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police calls on the Government of Ontario to work with police-based victim service providers, who agree to provide services that are consistent with provincially supported victim services, in the development of a funding formula which would augment victims' services in those communities.

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Title: Sustainability of Grant Funding

WHEREAS the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services has developed an integrated model entitled, "To Protect Children from Sexual Abuse and Exploitation On The Internet – A United Team Approach" (the "Provincial Strategy"), and

WHEREAS police services enter into funding agreements with the Ministry to support continued operations providing specialized investigative support on matters involving sexual abuse and exploitation of children on the Internet, which will contribute to the overall Provincial Strategy by building capacity and sustainability and supporting the establishment of a coordinated strategic plan among police services, Crown attorneys and victim support services, and

WHEREAS this initiative is valuable and serves to protect vulnerable children but requires sustained and reliable funding from the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police calls on the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services to commit to and include in all funding agreements an annual escalation clause (at a minimum, the rate of inflation) to its funding of its Provincial Strategy to Protect Children from Sexual Abuse and Exploitation on the Internet.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police calls on the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services to allow and provide in its funding agreements that approved but unspent grant monies be allowed to be carried from one year to the next, as long as it is used with the overall purpose of implementing the Provincial Strategy.

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**Title: Training for Ontario Police Officers** 

WHEREAS the Ontario Police College has established itself as a world class training institution, and

WHEREAS the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police supports the Ontario Police College as the police training provider of choice, and

WHEREAS the Ontario Police College ensures that standardized, progressive training remains relevant to the police services.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police supports the Ontario Police College as the primary provider of training for police officers in Ontario and calls upon the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services to fully support the Ontario Police College in the delivery of progressive training and credentialing in the Province of Ontario.

Title: Front Line Supervisor Training for Ontario Police Officers

WHEREAS the Ontario Police College has established itself as a world class training institution, and

WHEREAS the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police supports the Ontario Police College as the police training provider of choice, and

WHEREAS the Ontario Police College ensures that standardized, progressive training remains relevant to police services, and

WHEREAS the Ontario Police College, in consultation with the OACP Training, Education, and Professional Development Committee, has developed a Front-line Supervisor training course for newly promoted police Supervisors and those serving as Acting Supervisors, and

WHEREAS the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police recognizes the risks inherent in providing supervision to front-line police personnel, and

WHEREAS the Adequacy and Effectiveness Standards Regulation sets out a number of standards that guide police practices.

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police calls on the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services to develop and enact a supervisory standard by way of regulation to ensure that, at a minimum, all Sergeants and newly confirmed Sergeants complete the accredited Ontario Police College Front-line Supervisor Training.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any such supervisor training offered outside the Ontario Police College must be consistent with and sanctioned as having met, at minimum, the curriculum course standards as set out in the Ontario Police College Front Line Supervisor Course.

To help make Ontario accessible to persons with disabilities, the Integrated Accessibility Standards Regulation requires most organizations in the province to develop a multi-year accessibility plan.

The plan is to set out the steps an organization will take to comply with Ontario's accessibility laws and prevent and remove barriers.

The plan must set out how an organization will:

- · meet its accessibility requirements under the IASR on time
- address any current barriers to accessibility, and
- prevent and remove future barriers.

Attached please find the North Bay Police Service Accessibility Plan for 2013 – 2017. The plan has been posted to the Intranet and to the North Bay Police Service website.

The Integrated Accessibility Standards Regulation divides the Standards into four parts: General; Information and Communication; Employment; and Transportation. The requirements of the Standards under the IASR that apply to the North Bay Police Service are listed in Plan along with the action that has or will be taken, as well as the section responsible to ensure the North Bay Police Service meets Ontario's accessibility requirements.

Compliance with the AODA is required by both public and private sector organizations.

Regulations made under the Act require small and large organizations in both the public and private sectors to meet the developed standards with a goal of attaining accessibility by the year 2025.

Customer Service – Ontario Regulation 429/07: This standard was the first under the AODA to become law. It ensures that people with disabilities can receive goods and services in a manner that takes into account one's disability

standards comprise the recently enacted IASR. These standards will ensure accessibility in the areas of information & communications, employment and transportation. These requirements build on the Accessibility Standards for Integrated Accessibility Standards – Ontario Regulation 191/11: Three of the five accessibility Customer Service which is already in force.

The North Bay Police Service, through this Multi-year Accessibility Plan, will address barriers to accessibility related to the Standards identified in this Regulation. A number of initiatives have already been completed or are in progress, with others planned for the future. This plan will provide information on how the Service will prevent and remove barriers to accessibility and meet its obligations under the Integrated Accessibility Standards regulation.

# **Definitions**

# Accessible Formats:

May include, but are not limited to large print, recorded audio and electronic formats, braille and other formats useable by persons with disabilities.

# Assistive Device:

Any auxiliary tool, aid, technology or other mechanism that enables a person with a disability to do everyday tasks and activities such as moving, communicating or lifting; assists in accessing goods, services or information and helps the person to maintain their independence. Examples include but are not limited to: communication aids, cognition aids, personal mobility aids, and medical aids.

## Barrier:

including a physical barrier, an architectural barrier, an information or communications barrier, an attitudinal barrier, a Anything that prevents a person with a disability from fully participating in all aspects of society due to his/her disability technological barrier, a policy or a practice; ("obstacle").

# Communications:

The interaction between two or more persons or entities, or any combination of them, where information is provided, sent or received.

# Communications Supports:

May include, but are not limited to: captioning, alternative and augmentative communications supports, plain language, sign language and other supports that may facilitate effective communications.

# Conversion Ready:

An electronic or digital format that facilitates conversion into an accessible format.

## Disability:

- (a) any degree of physical disability, infirmity, malformation or disfigurement that is caused by bodily injury, birth defect or illness and, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, includes diabetes mellitus, epilepsy, a brain injury, any degree of paralysis, amputation, lack of physical co-ordination, blindness or visual impediment, deafness or hearing impediment, muteness or speech impediment, or physical reliance on a guide dog or other animal or on a wheelchair or other remedial appliance or device;
  - (b) a condition of mental impairment or a developmental disability,
- a learning disability, or a dysfunction in one or more of the processes involved in understanding or using symbols or spoken language; <u>ပ</u>
- (d) a mental disorder; or
- (e) an injury or disability for which benefits were claimed or received under the insurance plan established under the Workplace Safety and Insurance Act, 1997; ("handicap").

# Information:

Includes data, facts and knowledge that exist in any format, including text, audio, digital or images, that convey meaning.

# Ontario Human Rights Code:

A provincial law in Ontario that gives all citizens equal rights and opportunities without discrimination in specific areas such as employment, housing and services.

## Standard:

The criterion establishing what a person or organization must accomplish to achieve the minimum level of compliance. Accessibility Standards will be legislated by way of Ontario Regulations pursuant to the AODA.

**SUBJECT: Crime Severity Index** 

Attached is a report completed by Constable Keating on the 2012 Crime Severity Index (CSI).

I had an opportunity to read and meet with Constable Keating on the content of the document.

The 2012 CSI compares North Bay with 297 communities with a population over 10,000 people. North Bay had a rating of 75, placing our community below the national average but above the provincial average.

The 2012 Violent Crime Severity Index rates North Bay at 63.38, below the provincial average of 69.50 and the national average of 81.42. North Bay at 70.15 is below the national average of 72.50 in the Non-violent Crime Severity Index, but above the provincial average at 54.30.

Overall, figures for Canada, Ontario and North Bay indicate a continued decline of reported crime rates. The 2012 total crime figures reduced by 18258 nationally, compared with 2011 results.

My interpretation of these statistics suggests that North Bay remains a safer community to live in when compared to National and Provincial VCSI standings.

The North Bay Police Service new 2014-2016 Business Plan should continue to focus its goals and objectives on improving non-violent and our overall crime severity position.

This report contains a modest year to year comparison of Statistics Canada published crime figures for the years of 2011 and 2012 at the national, provincial, and municipal level.


#### **Introduction**

This analysis uses data submitted to Statistics Canada by police services across Canada. This report is an interpretation of those statistics, as are the reported index values and rankings. The North Bay Police Service is compared within the body of this report to other police locales with a population over 10,000 people, of which there were **297** in the year 2012.

#### Section I: Canada wide

<sup>1</sup>Per Statistics Canada, in 2011 there were 2,275,917 criminal incidents reported across Canada. In 2012, there was a **-2.9%** drop in total criminal incidents down to 2,235,325 across Canada.

<sup>2</sup>The same proportional downward shift is noted nationally for 2012 in terms of total adults and total youths charged with offences. In 2012, 556,563 adults, and 68,160 youths were charged, which represents a **0.14%** and **6.1%** drop respectively.



The crime severity index (CSI) is a measure used to highlight the relative severity of crimes in relation to their overall occurrences. The resulting statistic provides a more meaningful conceptualization of a series of considerations beyond a mere tabulation of occurrences.

The strength of the CSI is due to its heterogeneous makeup. As a result of this, the CSI can absorb unusual statistical events and remain valid and reliable as a measure of crime and severity. While crime rates and selected totals still provide valuable knowledge, the CSI provides another valuable measure with which to further understand data and totals.



#### Section II: NBPS 2012 Overall Crime Severity Index Rank

In 2012 the National Crime Severity Index (CSI) was 75. North Bay received an overall CSI score of 68.44, for a rank of 143. Out of 279 police services policing populations of 10,000 or more, the NBPS was 143. While the index score for North Bay was the same as 2011 (68.4), the types of offences and seriousness of each is not without distinction. The same index figure repeated over two calendar years is representative of the same overall levels of crime in terms of proportional frequency and severity.

North Bay's overall CSI ranks favorably to the Canadian average. When compared to Sturgeon Falls (47.41) and Sudbury Region (71.66) it can be observed that North Bay's index value of 68.4 appear to be consistent with the geographic disbursement of crime and population demographics.

#### **Violent Crime Severity Index**

For 2012 it is evident that North Bay (63.38) ranks favorably to the provincial and national violent crime figures. This shows that the overall CSI for North Bay is inflated by offences that are not violent as defined by the VCSI. These could be non-violent crimes, traffic, drug or other offences.

As a whole, North Bay compares favorably to national averages with index scores below the national average for each index (see table 1).

#### **National Rankings**

The lowest rank would have reported the most frequent and serious offences, the highest rank would have the fewest reports of frequent/serious offences. A high ranking is desirable in terms of lower index values. Alternatively put: low score=high rank

Overall, in 2011 North Bay was ranked 125 out of 239 locales with 10,000 people or more in Canada. In 2012 North Bay ranked 143 out of 297 locales with 10,000 people or more in Canada. This move marks a mild regression (4%) in overall ranking position (see table 2).

#### Section III: General crime statistics

#### 2011-2012 Violent Crime

In 2012, nationwide, there were some increases in violent offences from 2011. Abductions (28%), attempted murder (17%), sexual violations against children (7%), forcible confinement/kidnapping (3%) and extortion (5%) all rose by rate percentages.

These changes were juxtaposed nationally in 2012 with decreases in aggravated sexual assaults (-23%), assault peace officer (-17%), other violent offences (-16%), and indecent or harassing phone calls (-11%).

#### 2011-2012 Property Crime

Possession of stolen property incidents dropped 38% as a rate percentage from 2011, while Identity fraud (19%) and Arson (9%) were the only categories to rise in rate percentage. In 2012, as a total percentage the property crime rate dropped 4% from 2011.

#### 2011-2012 Criminal Code Traffic Violations

Impaired driving dropped by 1% in terms of rate from 2011. While this is a modest drop it continues the trend of downward movement that has seen impaired driving drop 25% as a percentage rate since 2002.

#### 2011-2012 Drug Offences

Cannabis possession and trafficking were down 5% as a rate from 2011, while cocaine possession was up 1% by rate, and possession of other drugs was up 4% by rate. These figures remained relatively consistent with 2011.

#### **Section IV: Conclusion**

According the available information from Statistics Canada, it appears as though overall crime figures, both rates and totals, are continuing the decline observed over the past decade. Issues with statistics such over/under reporting remain, however with the index values shown in this report, there remains many traditional and novel means for evaluating police progress and community safety in relation to the municipality, province, and country. These figures provide a numerical assessment of measures of criminality while providing our 'location' in reference to other populations.

As the Board is aware the provision of 911 and Fire Dispatch is the responsibility of the Municipality not the Police Services Board. Despite this fact there is a section in the Board's Operating Budget dedicated to 911/Fire Dispatch. In the 2013 Operating Budget the Board budgeted \$482,283.00 to cover the human resource costs associated to this portion of our Communications Centre.

Find attached a briefing note provided by the Information and Communications Technology Committee of the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police (CACP) regarding NG911. The Board will note from this document that the initial roll out NG911 commences in 2014 and while the mandated changes will provide benefits, there will be impacts on staffing, technology, video assets and risk management implications.

Both Ms. Andrews in Information Technology and Ms. Smith, our Communications Centre Manager have been involved in ongoing meetings and discussions locally with other emergency responders and provincially through OPTIC, OACP and CACP to learn more about the potential costs associated to NG911. At this point there are still many unanswered questions.

As of the date of this report we have advised the City of North Bay that \$159,210.00 is required in the Board's Capital Funding request for 2014 to cover infrastructure costs related to NG911. This has been a moving target for us as new information is shared between municipalities and emergency responders. At this point this is a, "best guess" using the most current information we have.

We are also anticipating a requirement to increase our staffing levels within our Communications Centre in 2014. Ms. Smith has been tasked with preparing a report for our service that will be shared with the Board as we move forward in our 2014 budget process.

#### Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) in Regard to NG911 (Next Generation)

NG911 stands for Next Generation 911. It will be based on digital technologies rather than analog technologies. The new digital infrastructure will allow many new operational capabilities. But like any major change, some of the impacts will be good, and some may increase the average work needed to handle a 911 call. NG911 has the potential to challenge our long-standing call taking / dispatching models. The initial rollout of NG911 will be implemented so that Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs) can provide mobile access to emergency services for the hard-of-hearing community. However, it is expected that the rollout of other digital capabilities (ex. videos and pictures) will be rolled out soon after.

#### Why should I be concerned about NG911?

Chiefs and senior administrators need to understand - NG911 IS COMING – everypolice PSAP will face these issues. Each installation and implementation will have a certain level of technological and environmental uniqueness. The handoff of calls and digital assets from primary to secondary PSAPs will have to be mapped out and tested. While the mandated NG911 changes will provide benefits, chiefs need to consider impacts on staffing, technology, video assets, and possible legal and risk management implications. We need only look at recent major events to see the soaring use of recorded video by those in attendance. The Boston Marathon Bombing was just one example.

### What kind of costs and work effort will be needed to make NG911 work on both the 911 side and the telephone side in my organization?

Budget planning should begin as soon as possible. Each organization will be somewhat unique in the effort that is required. However, we expect that there will be costs and effort on both the 911 side and the telephone side of the operation. These costs will vary greatly on the equipment that is running in your answering center today. If an older call management package is being used, is it capable of handling digital calls? Also, we understand there may be an interface needed between the 911 system and your computer aided dispatch system since the position identifier that is used to route the call to a particular call taker may no longer be supplied with the 911 call.

### What kind of staffing changes and other personnel costs will be needed to make NG911 work in my organization?

While each agency will be different, informal studies indicate that calls will be longer where texting or digital assets are involved in a 911 call. It is also quite possible the number of 911 calls will increase due to the ease of submitting a 911 message. Managing video may require new skill sets. Planning for these impacts should begin as soon as possible. Changes may come in a number of areas:

• **PSAP Staffing / Budget:** The call taker time per call is likely to be much longer in cases where texting is used. This could impact staffing significantly if texting begins to be accepted other than for TDD replacement. As well the average time per call may increase sharply due to the receipt of videos and other digital assets on a given call. Comments from those who have

implemented NG911 in the US indicate there are many operational advantages however there are substantial up-front costs and staffing impacts.

- National / Regional / Local Considerations: The process of implementing NG911 and all of
  the digital technology will vary greatly between primary versus secondary PSAPs, existing 911
  system or no existing 911, the geography and coverage of the area, and so on. The financial
  arrangements are also different in every province so there will be many considerations as this
  rolls out.
- Transition and Migration NG911: Much work is needed to get to new NG911 standards and it will be an evolutionary process. The end solution must be capable of a step-by-step implementation because no PSAP can get to full NG911 in one jump. The end result must be standards based.
- Disaster Recovery, Resiliency: Transferring calls from the main PSAP to a backup site will be
  much easier with digital technology. Backup sites for partner agencies do not have geographic
  boundaries. But of course the method of doing business would have to be known by the
  supporting agency (technology could assist greatly). Much work is needed to ensure a smooth
  transition.
- Digital Assets: Today most Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs) only have analog voice recorders. Logging, storage, management, disclosure and purging of all the new digital assets will have to take place. The storage and management of these items could result in significant additional cost.

#### Are there legislative changes needed?

Provinces such as New Brunswick and Manitoba have created legislation that limits the liability of the PSAP in such situations so that they cannot be sued for not having sufficient staff to view the number of videos that may come in on a certain call (clearly such legislation does not shield the PSAP against claims resulting from negligence). It is possible that a provincial government may wish to implement such legislation before implementing NG911 in their jurisdiction. Additionally, some provinces have funding legislation in effect that pays for 911 upgrades and increased demands for service. However, some provinces don't have funding legislation and police services in those provinces could have major budgetary impacts if costs are just passed along to the police PSAP.

#### Will NG911 cause policy changes or changes in the way we handle 911 calls today?

Yes - the policy structure necessary to support 911 will change significantly. There are new issues such as how to handle video and texting to the 911 center, the manner in which we forward calls to downstream partners (ex. Fire, EMS).

### Will people really send us video of events as they are happening? If so, what will that mean to us?

Yes. As proof of this we need only look at large events such as riots and demonstrations to see the amount of video that is generated. Today those videos go to YouTube but if they can be forwarded to

a 911 center, we can assume that at least some will end up there. Do we accept them, and if we do, is there a legal liability to view them in real-time? How will we store these videos for evidence?

### Will we be able to downstream call information to our partners (secondary PSAP) and will we still be able to listen to the call after we transfer it there?

In the digital world this should be easier to accomplish technically, however, how this will be accomplished is not entirely clear now. There are many rules and policies around this matter that must be resolved. For example, does the fire dispatch center want to receive all of the videos that are received at the primary 911 center? Many of the upgrade costs will be needed for each PSAP that receives forwarded calls and data. In some jurisdictions with multiple secondary PSAPs, this will be a substantial cost.

#### Why is NG911happening now?

The analog 911 system has been in place for many years in much of Canada, although there are a number of regions that still do not have 911 service. The Analog system works well and has been updated over the years to provide many features that are essential to operating a 911 system.

However, the world now relies on digital communications and in many areas analog 911 trunks are already being replaced with digital capabilities. Some regions on the east coast of Canada are already testing out the new digital capabilities. This move to the digital world is mandated by the CRTC therefore we cannot wait for it to come before we start planning and identifying issues. This has had the effect of providing a mandate for police services to move this forward very quickly. *Preparations must begin now* because the national rollout will begin in January 2014 and we must be ready. The first phase will support the hard-of-hearing community.

**Expansion of Conducted Energy Weapons (CEWs)** 

Recommendation: Information Item

On August 27, 2013 Minister Meilleur, Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services announced the authorization of the expansion for the use of CEWs. This announcement was made following the completion of the Ministry's review into CEW expansion, which involved multiple policing partners and stakeholders. During their review the Ministry also considered twelve separate coroner's inquest juries in the province of Ontario that made recommendations in favour of expanding the use of CEWs or the consideration of expansion. It should be noted that the OACP, OAPSB, PAO and TPA were all present during this press conference and all supportive of this announcement.

The Ministry will be amending the current Use of Force Guideline to provide police services with the discretion to determine which officers should be permitted to carry CEWs based on local needs. At present only supervisors and members of tactical and containment teams are authorized to carry CEWs. These changes will allow for the issuance of CEWs to front-line police personnel.

During this announcement the Minister made it clear that no provincial funding is being provided for this purpose. She also indicated that there will be increased reporting provisions and enhanced training included in the new guidelines.

Current qualification for CEW training is 8 hours and this will be expanded to 12 hours, including scenario-based training and training for interactions with people with mental health issues. Following this training there is a mandatory 4 hours of requalification training required on an annual basis.

Independent of costs associated to CEW training, the cost of a single CEW (X-26 Taser) is approximately \$1,500.00, the holster is approximately \$46.00 and individual cartridges are \$31.00.

We have allocated monies in our 2014 budget process to cover the costs to supplement our existing inventory of CEWs and to train our front-line officers in 2014.

A further report will be provided to the Board after we have received the amended Guidelines from the Ministry.
